FROM THE DESKS OF PASTORS SHERYL AND CHRISKESTER-BEYER

Dear Friends in Christ,

When Jesus came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, as was his custom." Luke 4:16

Last month in my newsletter article, I challenged each of us to think of worship as more than just the hour we might spend together during an actual worship service at church, but to think about worship as something we can do wherever we are-to learn to practice the presence of God daily as Brother Lawrence did.

But worship is also obviously the gathered fellowship of believers in a worship space, (i.e. the church) for the express purpose of praising God, hearing God's word and being strengthened and nourished by God to go back out into the world to follow and serve God where God has called us.

Richard Foster in his blog post "The Many Landscapes of Worship" shares with us some ideas for helping us to worship well when we do come together. First, Foster suggests spending some time preparing for worship: 'by going to bed early on Saturday night; by having an experience of examination and confession; by going over the Scriptures and hymns that will be used on Sunday; by gathering before the worship service begins to pray that God's presence will fill the room; by letting go in inward distractions so that you can be genuinely present.'

Second, Foster writes that we need 'learn to let go of our personal agenda...The language of the gathered fellowship is not "I" but "we."" In other words, worship is not just about having my own personal needs met. For example, we may not 'like' every song or hymn that is sung during worship or even the style of music of a particular hymn, but when we recognize that worship is not always about me, we learn to appreciate that although 'I' may not like a particular hymn, it can still have a place in the worship service, because it more than likely speaks to someone else in the gathered community. Letting go of our personal agenda also means learning that even when worship may not quite fit our needs or tastes, our presence and participation in the worship service can be an encouragement to those around us and this too is an important aspect of worship.

Next, Foster encourages us to cultivate a sense of holy expectancy. Foster writes, "a holy expectancy looks forward to God moving and acting and teaching and wooing and winning." One of the ways we can cultivate holy expectancy is by making time, either before we come to worship or even once we enter the sanctuary to pray and ask the Holy Spirit to open our hearts and minds to hear what God has to say to us today and to make us aware of his presence in the different elements of our worship service. But even if we don't 'feel' the Holy Spirit's presence or feel particularly moved by the worship service that day, we know that simply by gathering to worship our actions are pleasing to God.

These are just a few ways we can prepare ourselves for worship. If you've never thought about worship as being something that you need to prepare for—that all you need to do is show up and you're good; then I would like to encourage you to try some of these ideas and see if they don't deepen your understanding of worship and enhance your worship experience.

Come, let us worship the Lord! Pastor Sheryl
